



Safety Plaques Awarded to 15 CTA Locations

FIFTEEN CTA operating stations and installations were the recipients of plaques awarded for reducing their accident experience in 1963 when presentations were made at the annual dinner of the Chicago Safety Council held May 21 at the Sherman hotel.

Eight of the awards, in the commercial fleet classification, went to surface system stations, and one to the Utility Department. Six others, in the industrial safety category, were awarded to various CTA departments and divisions.

Plaques were presented to Beverly, 69th, Archer, Lawndale, 52nd, North Park and Keeler stations. In the industrial safety division, plaques were received by South Shops, Rapid Transit Ter-

minals, Track and Structures Division, Stores Dept., Electrical Dept. and General Office.

Six Employes Share Suggestion Awards

SIX SUGGESTION awards totaling \$50.00 were announced during the month of April just prior to the launching of a new effort to stimulate increased employe participation through the addition of two new incentive awards and a direct mailing campaign to the homes of all employes.

The six employes who shared the cash prizes were George Kuenstle (North Avenue) and Walter Sundquist (South Shops) of the Shops and Equipment Department; Joseph A. Lacy and William Moog of the Construction and Maintenance Department; William F. Rehder, Electrical Department, and Patricia M. Barrett, Reproduction Services division.

The Suggestion Plan committee also announced that during the 12-month period from April 1, 1963, to March 31 of this year a total of 121 suggestions were adopted and the sum of \$1,405.00 in cash prizes distributed to employes in original and supplemental awards.

CTA Radio Series Wins Ad Club Award Again

FOR THE second year in a row, CTA was presented with a merit award by the Chicago Federated Advertising Club for its series of radio commercials designed to increase the volume of rapid transit riding. The commercials were heard on stations WMAQ, WIND, and WGN recently.

The awards are recognized as symbols of excellence in the field of advertising and graphic arts and are highly-prized trophies, rivaling in prestige national award presentations.

The winning entries consisted of a series of oneminute spot announcements dramatizing the advantages offered by CTA rapid transit service over the use of private automobiles during rush-hour periods in driving to and from work.

The scripts were developed by the John W. Shaw Advertising Agency of Chicago in cooperation with CTA's Public Information Department.

Service Areas of 15¢ Downtown Routes Expanded

CTA'S 15¢ bus services in downtown Chicago were more than doubled and the area of reduced fare operations was expanded, effective Monday, June 22, better to serve the retail-business district, the North Western and Union stations, and the Grant Park and Soldier Field parking lots.

Chairman George L. DeMent of Chicago Transit Board said the revised and increased reduced fare services were the result of the co-operation accorded CTA by Mayor Daley; Ben W. Heineman, chairman of the North Western Railroad, and E. L. Potarf, chairman of the executive committee of the Union Station company.

Instead of the five 15¢ services now operating from two stations, there are eleven routes--five serving the North Western station, four serving the Union station, and two serving both stations.

HOURS OF 15¢ DEPOT SERVICE

For most of these routes, the special fare area is bounded generally by Kinzie, Michigan, Harrison and Canal, and the reduced rate applies from approximately 7 a.m. to 2 p.m. to passengers boarding at either station, and from 12 noon to 9 p.m. to depot-bound passengers boarding at authorized stops within the special fare area.

Advantages of the expanded 15¢ services include: Direct door delivery and pickup at the two stations featured later by under-shelter boarding and alighting at North Western station; increased frequency of rush-hours service to and from both stations; elimination of mid-block jay-walking which is especially hazardous at North Western station; more east-west and north-south 15¢ services directly to or more conveniently serving more buildings and more sections of the downtown area; more reduced-fare feeder lines connecting with the elevated and subway routes; and reduction of traffic congestion in Canal and Randolph streets.

The nine reduced-fare bus services divided between the two stations are shown on page 5, along with the new routing in the Loop area.

All nine of these routes, excepting Archer (No. 62), terminate at the stations they serve. The Archer route, however, continued to operate to the Wacker drive terminals but now turns west in Wacker to Randolph and south in Canal to serve the North Western station during weekday morning rush hours.

THREE 15¢ ROUTES UNCHANGED;

NO. 142 ELIMINATED; NO. 148 REVISED

The two reduced fare routes serving both the North Western and Union stations are the Wacker Express (No. 158A) and Wacker-Orleans (No. 128). The 15¢ rate in the reduced-fare area applies on 11 routes 5-6 days a week. The reduced fare will not apply on any Sunday depot service provided by any of these routes.

The expanded depot services are designed specifically to attract riders from among the 60,000 weekday railroad commuters using the two stations, and to encourage more short distance riding within the downtown area.





AMONG THE June 1 retirements were two employes whose combined service records totaled 76 years. Senior of the two was Clyde B. North, assistant comptroller, who had completed 41 years with the former Chicago Motor Coach company and CTA. The other was Henry Wilson, superintendent, Dist. Completing the group of 13 downtown reduced-fare routes are the Michigan-State-Wacker route (No. 149), which long has served the Merchandise Mart, the downtown retail - business district, and the Soldier Field parking lot, and the Monroe parking lot shuttle (No. 148). The latter route was revised. It will operate only as far west as LaSalle street most of its operating day. Between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m., Monday through Friday, however, it will operate as far west as Wacker. Route No. 142, a weekday morning and afternoon shuttle now operating between the two depots and downtown, is being discontinued.

From the outer reaches of the routes being revised to terminate at one or the other of the two depots direct service will be available at the regular rate of fare (25¢ per adult, 12¢ per child or student). Persons boarding the 15¢ buses in the reduced-fare area and desiring to transfer to other routes will pay the regular basic fare, plus the 5¢ transfer charge. Valid transfers from other routes will be accepted.

Bus boarding and alighting locations at the two stations are directly in front of the east entrance-exits. So that North Western commuters may board and alight at the entrance-exit of the suburban concourse, the City of Chicago established a southbound lane for buses only along the west curb of Canal between Randolph and Washington. Union station buses use River Drive along the east frontage of the Union station complex. The major commuter services at Union station are provided by the Burlington and Milwaukee railroads.

The North Western railroad is constructing a series of additional stairways between the upper-level commuter train platforms and the suburban concourse to speed the flow of commuters to and from the new bus-berthing locations in Canal. Later a canopy is to be erected at the exit-entrance of the concourse to shelter boarding and alighting commuters during inclement weather. It is estimated that these improvements will cost between \$200,000 and \$300,000.

Drexel-Hyde Park (Route No. 1)

Operates to N. W. Station via Michigan, Randolph, and Canal; returning to Loop via Canal, Washington, Michigan, and over regular route - Monday through Saturday from 7:15 a.m. to 11:50 p.m.

Hyde Park (Route No. 2)

Operates to N.W. Station via Michigan, Adams, Franklin, Randolph, and Canal; returning to Loop via Canal, Washington, Wacker, Jackson, Michigan, and over regular route - Monday through Friday during rush hours only.

Division (Route No. 70)

Operates to N. W. Station via State, Randolph, and Canal; returning to Loop via Canal, Washington, Dearborn and over regular route - 24 hours daily.

Archer (Route No. 62)

Operates to Wacker drive terminals then to N. W. Station via Wacker, Randolph, and Canal; returning to Loop via Canal, Washington, Franklin, Monroe, State, and over regular route - Monday through Friday during a.m. rush only.

Wacker-North Western Station (Route No. 158)

Operates to N.W. Station from Ontario street via Wabash, Wacker, Randolph, and Canal; returning via Washington, Wacker, Michigan, and Ontario - Monday through Friday from 7:15 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.

Operates to N.W. Station from Ohio street via Michigan, Wacker, Randolph, and Canal; returning via Canal, Washington, Wacker, Wabash, and Ohio - Monday through Friday from 2:00 p.m. to 5:30 p.m.

REVISED BUS ROUTES SERVING UNION STATION

Garfield Local (Route No. 6)

Operates to Union Station via Wabash, Adams, and River drive; returning to Loop via River drive, Jackson, Michigan and over regular route - Monday through Saturday from 6:30 a.m. to 11:50 p.m., Sunday from 10:20 a.m. to 11:50 p.m.

Sheridan Local (Route No. 151)

Operates to Union Station via Michigan, Adams, and River drive; returning to Loop via River drive, Jackson, State, Washington, Michigan and over regular route - Monday through Saturday from 6:50 a.m. to 12:45 a.m., Sunday from 9:00 a.m. to 12:45 a.m.

Wilson-LaSalle Local (Route No. 156)

Operates to Union Station via LaSalle, Adams, and River drive; returning to Loop via River drive, Jackson, LaSalle and over regular route - Monday through Friday from 7:10 a.m. to 6:15 p.m., Saturday from 7:35 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.

Ohio-Union Station (Route No. 157)

Operates to Union Station via Michigan, Randolph, Wacker, Adams, and River drive; returning to Loop via River drive, Jackson, Wacker, Washington, Michigan and over regular route - Monday through Saturday from 7:10 a.m. to 8:10 p.m.

Contracts Awarded for Two Rapid Transit Projects

TWO CONTRACTS aggregating \$236,865 for signal equipment for an automatic interlocking system at the Logan Square terminal and for structural steel to rehabilitate the 35th street station were awarded June 4 by Chicago Transit Board.

A contract for \$157,475 was awarded to the Union Switch & Signal Division, Westinghouse Air Brake Co., of Swissvale, Pa., for signal equipment for automatic interlocking at the Logan Square terminal of the West-Northwest rapid transit route.

The present mechanical interlocking system, which is 52 years old, is out-dated and replacement parts are no longer available. The new system can be controlled automatically when trains are using only two loading tracks and manually for switching movements during rush hours. The con-

tract calls for the purchase of equipment only. The installation will be by CTA workmen.

Structural steel for reinforcing and rehabilitating the 35th street station on the North-South route is being purchased under a contract for \$79,390 awarded to the Allied Structural Steel company, of 20 N. Wacker drive. The steel to be installed by CTA personnel will be used to repair and reconstruct the elevated structure at 35th street which was damaged by fire on October 17, 1962.

Some of the steel supplied under this contract will be corrosion resistant for use in the canopy structure. This type of steel will require no maintenance. It will be left unpainted and after a period of time through oxidation will take on an attractive reddish-blue color. This will be CTA's first use of steel of this type.

New Escalator for Logan Terminal

SOMETHING NEW will be added to the Logan Square terminal - the busiest transfer station on the rapid transit system - as the result of action taken by the Chicago Transit Board at its May 3 meeting.

This will be an automatic escalator for which a contract was awarded to the Montgomery Elevator company of Moline, Illinois, on a bid of \$47,617. The bid includes fabrication and installation of the new facility in a pit site prepared by CTA forces.

The escalator is expected to be in operation in October. Total cost of the project will be approximately \$77,000. The Montgomery Elevator company is now installing an escalator at the remodeled Howard street rapid transit terminal which is expected to be in use by early July.



Two Retirees Die in Florida

TWO RETIRED CTA supervisory employes were taken by death recently in the South where they maintained retirement homes.

Edward E. Kretschmer of Roseland, Florida, started his transit career in the Purchasing Department of the former Chicago Rapid Transit company in March, 1903, and subsequently became director of purchasing for that company and for the North Shore Line, C.A. & E.R.R., and the South Shore Line before the CTA consolidation. He died May 2 at the age of 84 years. He retired on February 1, 1948, after 45 years of service.

Mr. Kretschmer was one of the organizers of the Chicago Purchasing association and a 55-year member of the Masonic fraternity. He is survived by his widow, Helen, two daughters and several grandchildren.

Funeral services for Lyman B. Herrin, 75, were held in Lake Jackson, Texas, where he resided, on May 29. He joined the former CRT in 1920 as assistant employment manager and served with CTA's Employment Department until his retirement in 1954. He is survived by his widow, Edna, and a daughter.

SINCE THE Courtesy Caravan Club was established, many letters of commendation for employes have been received. The publicity given the program designed to emphasize and improve the relationship between operating personnel and the customers we serve has generated a better public acknowledgement of good personal service on the part of CTA employes.

Such an expression of appreciation for a thoughtful and considerate action by James Walsh, badge no. 186, senior station instructor, rapid transit division, is quoted below:

"Last night, due to the press of my own business affairs and the brevity of visiting hours at Michael Reese, I asked my three oldest children to come to my office by CTA in order that we might go from there to see their mother. My oldest child is 11 1/2 and quite self-possessed, but this was her first trip alone on CTA as far as the Loop. I told them to get off at Van Buren, forgetting that in the subway the station is called Jackson. The kids overshot the station by several stops and got off the train scared and lost. Mr. James Walsh saw them and took charge. He not only instructed them on how to get to my office, but seeing how frightened they were, he took them to my building personally.

"If you are a parent, I do not believe I need to explain why I am writing this letter. In fact, even if you aren't, I think you will understand why I want to express my gratitude to Mr. Walsh and to bring what he did to your attention."

From an executive of a large metropolitan Chicago newspaper comes this commendation for Operator Theodore Hubbard, badge no. 8100, North Park:

"My attention was first drawn to him when I heard him politely and patiently explain several times over to an elderly woman what route to take and where to board her bus. Then, to my surprise and true delight, this man called out important stops, loudly and pleasantly, in a manner which I have never heard before - and I am a regular rider of the CTA.

"At Armitage he called out the name of the street and added: 'Academy of Sciences and the Lincoln Park Zoo.' At Wisconsin, he announced 'Change to Ogden, Presbyterian-St. Luke's and

County hospital.' At Goethe, he called out 'Sandburg Village' and all the rest of the way downtown, he called out names of adjacent hotels, important buildings or attractions, in addition to transfer information.

"This operator made my bus ride an interesting and exciting one, and to accomplish this with a native Chicagoan merely riding a bus is an achievement indeed. He made the city sound exciting and important - which it is - and I am sure left the feeling among passengers, especially if they were strangers - that this is a wonderful place and the CTA is certainly a pleasant ride!"

There are other letters which voice complaints about CTA service. This is usually because some employe has been discourteous or has conducted himself in a manner which has aggravated the patron. Here's a case in point:

"I have been a constant rider and never have had reason to complain about CTA service. But recently I encountered a very rude, impolite operator. When I boarded his bus he yelled at me to hurry up. His voice was so loud that I was startled. I paid my fare and sat down. I noticed he treated all his passengers in the same manner. All this was bad enough, but when he exercised this treatment on a kindly old lady, well I thought this was just too much. Apparently there are still some of your employes who have chosen to ignore your courtesy campaign."

COMMENT: Service is the product that CTA sells. If we don't make it the best possible form of public transportation, our patrons will not buy it. Discourtesy or rudeness will close the doors on needed business.

MEDICALLY SPEAKING

SUN BATHING - BENEFICIAL OR HARMFUL

BY THE time this article reaches you the summer swimming and outing season will be in full swing. Therefore, it would seem a brief summary of the pros and cons for sunbathing would be of interest to most of you.

Millions of Americans spend millions of dollars every season trying to improve their health and appearance by sunbathing. At the same time many who overexpose themselves bring about much suffering from sun burns. The sun, a gigantic fireball, is estimated by scientists to be one million times the size of our earth. Without the sun every living thing, plant life and human life, would soon die. Our very existence depends on sunshine to a certain extent.

What does the proper exposure to the sun do?

The main effect of the sun on our bodies is to increase the pigment (Melanin Granules) in the deeper layers of the skin. The pigmented cells tend to migrate toward the outer surface and thereby produce the sun tan. A proper sun tan forms a protective coat for the entire body.

It is generally known that red-heads, blondes and fair skinned persons have less pigment on their skin and these individuals burn easily upon exposure. These people are also more susceptible to skin cancers because of the lack of proper protective pigment. Brunettes and dark skin persons take a better tan. The term sunlight, includes, in addition to visible light, both ultraviolet and infrared light. Most of the sunburns are due to excessive exposure to the ultraviolet rays.

The healthful effects of sun bathing are briefly (1) It aids in the prevention and cure of rickets by producing Vitamin "D" in the skin. (2) It also is claimed that our general resistance is improved and thus is a factor in preventing colds. (3) Proper exposure to the sun often brings about a feeling of well-being, relaxation, warmth and improved circulation. Even animals know how to expose their wounds to the sun for better healing.

Some of the harmful effects of excessive sunbathing are:

- (1) Sunburn is, of course, the most common. In the severe cases the suffering is great as is also the time loss.
- (2) Sun strokes still occur and are very disabling.
- (3) In the tropics skin cancers are more frequent, thus confirming the theory that excessive sun has some carcinogenetic effect.
- (4) Premature aging of the skin is noted by the dry, wrinkling leathery appearance frequently seen in farmers and sailors.
- (5) Prolonged sun makes the hair dry and brit-. tle.
- (6) Unfavorable changes in the circulation indirectly affecting blood pressure are sometimes noted.

The following health tips from the AMA about sunbathing may be helpful to you.

- (1) Take it easy at first. Tan slowly start with 10-minute exposure and increase it 10 minutes each successive day.
- (2) Suntan lotions and creams can screen out some of the burning ultraviolet rays and thus reduce the burn. They can't speed up the tanning.
- (3) Suntan pills can help those with sensitive skins to avoid burns. However they should only be used as directed by your doctor.
- (4) Protect your hair, eyes, nose and lips when sunbathing.
- (5) Lubricate the skin with cream or lotion after a day in the sun to help offset the excessive drying effects.
- (6) Remember that sunlight can be "tonic" or "toxic" in its effect on your health.



Announce School Tuition Plan for Employes

CTA EMPLOYES are eligible for financial aid to help them better their education under a new tuition refund plan recently approved by General Manager Walter J. McCarter.

The plan specifies that applicants must enroll in courses relating to their CTA jobs and must be full-time permanent employes. Those who meet these and the other qualifications required by the plan become eligible for a tuition refund of up to \$250.00 for each calendar year, beginning September 1 and ending August 31.

Consideration for a tuition refund will be given to selected courses only if they are related to the employe's CTA job and prove beneficial to him in his work, or help him to prepare for a better position as one becomes available.

In order to qualify for reimbursement employes must meet two additional requirements: namely, they must receive a satisfactory grade in the course or courses in which they are enrolled and must be actively employed by CTA at the end of the course.

A satisfactory grade is defined as at least a "C" grade or its equivalent where "C" is average, "D" is below average but passing, and "E" is failing. The assistance will be paid only upon satisfactory completion of study courses and the amount refunded will vary according to the grade received. Full tuition will be paid for the grade of "A", 85 per cent for the grade of "B", and 75 per cent for a grade of "C". No reimbursement will be made for registration fees, laboratory fees, books or other expenses.

Refunds, under the tuition plan, will not be paid if assistance is received from other sources such as the GI bill, fellowships or scholarships. Application can be made on the form reproduced on page 12 of this issue of CTA Transit News or a form obtainable from supervisory personnel in each department. The plan becomes effective with the present summer term. Course description, class schedule, grading system, and tuition charge must accompany the application. The application will be reviewed by the department head to determine that all requirements are met. Final approval will be made by the Superintendent of Employment and Training, and the applicant notified of decision.

After payment of tuition, the employe must furnish receipts or other satisfactory proof of payment. At the end of each term, the employe must present evidence of completion with a satisfactory grade for each approved course. This evidence will be forwarded to the superintendent of employment and training who will make arrangements for reimbursement.

Educational Survey to Up-date Personnel Records

On page 13 of this issue there is also an educational survey questionnaire form. Mr. McCarter requests that all employes complete this form as the information will be valuable in determining the educational background of all active CTA employes. This form has no connection with the tuition refund plan. Employes are asked to complete the form and give it to their supervisor who will review it and forward it to the Training and Accident Prevention Department where it will become part of the employe's permanent record at CTA.

THE SECOND largest class in the history of the surface traffic supervisor training program was graduated recently when 32 Transportation Department employes completed the regular course and qualified for the supervisor's pool. The men selected were from 10 operating stations and will be assigned to supervisory duties as future vacancies occur in this classification. The graduating group is pictured here with I. J.
