

Board Approves Contract

for New Tech-35th Station

A CONTRACT for \$342,510 for the reconstruction of the station at Tech-35th on the North-South rapid transit route was awarded July 2 by Chicago Transit Board to the B. R. Abbot Construction Company of Chicago.

Completely fireproof, the new station facilities will replace those damaged by fire in October, 1962. Work is to start about August 1, and is to be completed in about six months.

The new street-level station building at 35th street, will be constructed of face brick with interior walls of blue glazed brick. The canopy over the entrance to the station will be of arched corrugated asbestos in a modern design. Bronze colored aluminum panels will enhance the appearance of the front of the building. Two double agents' booths will be located in the station.

A walkway, about 120 feet long, will be constructed of masonry solar screen consisting of concrete blocks with a grillwork effect. An escalator and stairways will lead from the walkway to the center of the platform.

The train platform, about 424 feet long and 15 feet wide, will be concrete. A canopy covering the

entire platform will be constructed of beige plasticcoated steel panels with alternating white and green plastic panels in the center section. The stairway and escalator enclosures on the platform will have walls of bronze colored aluminum and glass panels.

The auxiliary station at 34th street will be a semi-open structure of masonry construction with a covered stairway leading to the platform.

Recently Chicago Transit Board awarded a contract for the structural steel for reinforcing and repairing the entire structure at the Tech-35th station. This work will be performed by CTA crews simultaneously with the work being performed by the B. R. Abbot company.

Chicago Transit Board also awarded a contract for \$25,404 to Femco, Inc., of Irwin, Pa., for the purchase of 58 trainphones. Fifty-five of the phones will be used on the West-Northwest (Douglas-Logan and Congress-Logan) route and three will be used to equip additional cars on the Skokie Swift service. Delivery is scheduled by December 1. When these trainphones are installed, all CTA rapid transit routes will be equipped with the trainphones.

NEW ADVERTISING CONTRACT AWARDED

AWARD WAS made recently of a service contract for handling sales of advertising display space in and on CTA equipment and other operating properties to O'Ryan and Batchelder, Inc., one of the nation's leading transportation advertising agencies.

The new agency succeeds the Chicago Car Advertising company which has managed the sales of CTA transit display advertising space since CTA began operations on October 1, 1947, excepting for a two and one-half year period in 1951-53. Chicago Car also represents suburban commuter railroads

and suburban bus companies in the sale of advertising displays in their equipment.

With "home" offices in Peoria, Illinois, and Memphis, Tennessee, O'Ryan and Batchelder represent such major transit operations as the New York subway system, and the transit systems in Boston, Baltimore, Cleveland, Cincinatti, Duluth-Superior, Indianapolis, Milwaukee, Philadelphia, and St. Louis, and other smaller cities.

The contract with O'Ryan and Batchelder is to become effective January 1, 1965.

OUR COVER: An aerial view of Chicago's front yard looking north from Monroe street is a spectacular scene on a summer day. The waters of Chicago harbor in the foreground are dotted with small craft and cruisers clustered around the Chicago Yacht Club and the Columbia Yacht Club, which jut out into the off-shore waters. New to the scene is the Outer Drive East apartment building on Randolph street, to the north of the harbor, and across the Drive is the Monroe street parking lot, jam-packed with cars of Loop workers as is usual on business days. Across the Randolph street bridge over the Illinois Central Railroad yards is the Prudential building and other tall North Michigan structures which form the pattern of Chicago's skyline as seen from the lake.

Program Approved for Modernizing Substations

A TEN-YEAR program for modernizing CTA facilities for converting 25-cycle alternating current to direct current at an estimated cost of \$11,620,000 was approved by Chicago Transit Board on June 19.

Under a cost-sharing arrangement with the Commonwealth Edison Company in accordance with the general pattern of its rules on file with the Illinois Commerce Commission, the cost of the program is to be shared on a 60-40 basis by Edison and CTA.

CTA is Edison's only customer using 25-cycle power. Both Edison's 25-cycle generating equipment and CTA's facilities for converting it are obsolete and costly to operate and maintain. This will involve the installation of equipment in 19 substations.

Fifteen other substations already have equipment for converting the 60-cycle alternating current to direct current. Chicago's rapid transit trains, like similar systems elsewhere in the country, operate on direct power. Direct current also is used by CTA for trolley bus operation.

The first three substations to be changed over to conversion of 60-cycle current are Harding, 1920 S. Harding avenue; 20th street, 2001 S. Dearborn street, and 42nd street, 4200 S. Wabash avenue. Modernization of these three substations is to be completed by December 31, 1966.

Sixteen other substations to be modernized are Broadway, 5847 Broadway; Ravenswood, 4650 Lincoln avenue; Sedgwick, 1544 Sedgwick avenue; Lill, 1017 W. Lill avenue; Illinois, 152 W. Illinois street; Lombard, 117 S. Lombard avenue; Milwaukee, 1085 Milwaukee avenue; State, 1235 S. State street; Western, 2357 W. Washington boulevard; Hermitage, 619 S. Hermitage avenue; Homer, 1934 N. Campbell avenue; Franklin, 321 S. Franklin street; Kolmar, 616 S. Kolmar avenue; 44th, 3140 W. 44th street; Crawford, 3348 N. Pulaski road, and Grand, 4004 W. Grand avenue.

Subject to Illinois Commerce Commission approval of the Edison expenditure, the entire program is to be completed not later than December 31, 1974.

Apprenticeship Standards Set Up for Craft Unions

STANDARDS OF apprenticeship were established recently to provide a uniform training program for developing fully qualified, skilled journeymen for various CTA operations.

The standards were developed with the assistance of the Bureau of Apprenticeship and Training of the United States Department of Labor and were reviewed and accepted by the craft unions concerned. The standards cover such procedures as the selection of apprentices, term of apprenticeship, and the extent of on-the-job training and related technical instruction.

The standards also provide that when an apprentice successfully concludes the prescribed term of training, a certificate of completion of apprenticeship will be issued by the Bureau of Apprenticeship and Training.

CTA employes who are apprentices in the following crafts are presently covered by the standards: automotive mechanics, machinists, carpenters (automotive body builders), electrical workers (automotive), sheet metal workers (automotive), and blacksmiths.



In connection with the program, CTA was recently presented with a Certificate of Registration "for all Apprenticable Occupations included in the program." The certificate was "issued in recognition of the apprenticeship system, registered as part of the National Apprenticeship Program in accordance with the fundamentals recommended by the Federal Committee on Apprenticeship."

THIS TRIO, on their lunch break from a Wabash avenue business school, proved that three is not a crowd in one of the new extra-wide seats.







Equal monthly installments to currently retire Series of 1947, 1952 and 1953 Revenue Bonds by purchase in the open market, after invitation for tenders, or by call on next interest date.

Deposits may be made in the Depreciation Reserve Fund only to the extent that earnings are available therefor. The requirements for these deposits, however, are cumulative, and any balances available for Depreciation must first be applied to cover prior period deficiencies which may exist in deposits to the Depreciation Reserve Fund. The Supplemental Trust Agreements covering Series of 1952 and 1953 Revenue Bonds provide for quarterly deposits of \$300,000 and \$16,713.50, respectively, (cumulative within any one year) to the "Revenue Bond Amortization Funds" to the extent that earnings are available therefor after making the required deposits to the Depreciation Reserve Fund; also, that deposits of \$900,000 are to be made to the Operating Expense Reserve Fund in any calendar year that earnings are available therefor. Deposits to the Municipal Compensation Fund may be made only from earnings remaining in any one year after making all required deposits in the Depreciation Reserve, Revenue Bond Amortization and Operating Expense Reserve Funds.

IN ANY story of the development and growth of Chicago communities, the years between 1850 and 1860 must be noted as a decade when many new city neighborhoods came into being.

In this category is the northwest area that is known as North Park, whose early history dates back to the time when it was still part of Jefferson Township. In 1855, a village was laid out and its map recorded. A few frame houses were constructed, but the village was handicapped by a lack of transportation. Instead of becoming a suburban village as planned, North Park developed into a market place for the surrounding population.

German and Swedish farmers who raised vegetables along the south bank of the north branch of the Chicago river were the original settlers. There was also a movement of Bohemian families into the community in 1877, following the establishment of the Bohemian National Cemetery in what now is the Foster-Pulaski area.

When North Park was annexed to Chicago in 1889 as part of the town of Jefferson, a large tract of wooded land, prairie and farmland was brought within the city limits. The annexation gave the first great emphasis to the development of North Park.

One of the important developments came in 1893, when the Swedish Evangelical Mission Covenant purchased over 97 acres of land and received as a grant about eight and one-half acres, between Kedzie and Spaulding avenues, designated as the site upon which to establish a college. The following year the first buildings of North Park college were erected. The remainder of the undeveloped tract, consisting largely of brush and woods, later was subdivided for residential purposes.


The establishment of the college attracted increasing numbers of residents of Scandinavian origin or descent, and the subdivision and sale of lots combined with the extension of streetcar service on Lawrence and Elston avenues brought more home seekers into the community during the next few decades. There was, however, still much undeveloped land in the area, and the ample vacant







LOCATED ON the campus of North Park college, on Spaulding avenue south of Devon, are several of the newer buildings which house a library, memorial chapel and other student facilities. Center of this group is the seminary, topped by the cross. When North Park college, founded in 1891, was established, the area consisted largely of an undeveloped acreage of brush and woods.

SINCE 1905, the Municipal Tubercolosis Sanitarium at Bryn Mawr avenue and Pulaski road, has been a haven of hope for stricken Chicagoans. Built on wasteland, it is now situated on tree-shaded acreage amidst landscaped grounds that provide a pleasant atmosphere for patients.





IN THE northwest section of North Park community, at Foster and Cicero avenues, is Labagh Woods, under the jurisdiction of the Cook County Forest Preserve District. A marker alongside the curving entrance drive notes that the spacious recreation area honors "Ella Labagh, a pioneer in establishing forest preserves." On bright summer holidays and weekends, the preserve comes alive with picnickers and others seeking the enjoyment of a day outdoors.



SOME 3,000 students are enrolled during the regular school year at the strikingly modern Chicago Teachers College, North, at Bryr. Mawr and St. Louis avenues. It is one of the city's newer institutions of higher learning, having been built in 1961.

A DIFFERENT perspective is provided by this aerial view of CTA's North Park station, 3112 Foster avenue. In the foreground is the garage building, housing the shops and storerooms. acreage available caused the city to establish the Chicago Parental school at Foster and Central Park avenues in 1900 and the Chicago Municipal Tuberculosis Sanitarium at Bryn Mawr and Pulaski Road in 1905.

The years from 1910 to 1930 were a period of substantial subdividing and building in North Park, despite inadequate transit facilities. The Ravenswood branch of the elevated system was the only rapid transitline extending close to the community, and its terminal at Kimball and Lawrence was located at least four blocks from North Park's southern boundary. However, construction was particularly active in the area bounded by Bryn Mawr and Kedzie avenues and the River and Pulaski Road. Most of the new buildings were brick bungalows and two-flats. Until the early twenties no apartment buildings were permitted in the community.

By the middle twenties, however, there was considerable construction activity in the area, consisting mostly of two and three-flat buildings and a number of small apartment structures. By 1930, over one half of the residential buildings in North Park were single-family dwellings, predominantly brick bungalows and two-family two-deckers.

North Park's residential development slackened considerably during the 1930's. One of the reasons was the lack of direct rapid transit to downtown Chicago. While bus and feeder bus lines had been installed on Foster and Kimball avenues and the Kedzie avenue carline had been extended to Bryn Mawr avenue, the northern part of the community still was without convenient public transportation, a factor which no doubt delayed the greater development of the section west of Pulaski road and north of Peterson avenue.

In the 40's and succeeding years the population of North Park had taken a brisk upward swing, following the trend of the whole Chicago and suburban area. It still retains, however, the characteristics of a residential community, with single or two-family dwellings comprising the majority of housing units. It is a community of well-kept homes and owner-occupancy is widespread.

Lincoln Village, a flourishing shopping center at Kimball and Peterson avenues, has served to stimulate the business activity in recent years, and at several other locations, such as Kimball and Foster avenues, substantial commercial areas also have developed.

A notable addition to the community so far as it relates to CTA was the construction of the North Park station at Kedzie and Foster avenues, which was placed in service on May 28, 1950. It was the second modern bus servicing facility built by CTA following the takeover of Chicago transit properties. The first was Beverly station at 103rd and Vincennes avenue which began operating in December, 1949.



AN IMPORTANT factor in personal service is courteous treatment of customers. Nothing does more to improve public relations and create a feeling of good will in daily contacts with the public than a cheerful manner and helpful attitude.

First of all, courteousness is spontaneous and is reflected in everything you do or say. You can be courteous if you want to be. Every act and word that goes into proper performance of duty is indicative of your attitude toward the job that provides your livelihood.

The spirit of good service is manifested by the way we conduct ourselves in the eyes of the public. To them we all represent CTA. Courtesy plays a prominent part in continuing our efforts to provide the best possible service.

Courtesy pays dividends, too. You notice that when you are courteous, you are treated courteously by them. You hold your temper even when others are rude because you know no argument is ever really won. When you are pleasant of manner and do your job well you make your job easier because you gain the cooperation of those whom you are paid to serve. Favorable rider reactions to good job performance are cited in the following letters from riders:

"I was deeply moved by a good deed performed by your bus driver, badge No. 1771 (Operator A. G. Hutchinson, North Park). It was about 7:00 in the evening when I boarded a bus at Addison and Broadway heading for the Loop. After we crossed Belmont going down Broadway the bus stopped suddenly and I noticed our driver walking his way against traffic to the other side of the street. I couldn't imagine what emergency prompted the driver to stop in the middle of a block then dash across the street against traffic. To my utter amazement I noticed him take the arm of a blind man who was carrying a white cane and escort him across Belmont avenue. What fine character your driver has. His kindness restored my faith in humanity. He is a splendid advertisement for CTA."

Another letter, praising Operator James C. Howard, badge No. 2952, Kedzie, cites this incident:

"Recently I had an occasion to board one of your buses at 16th street and Kedzie avenue. The bus was southbound. When I discovered I had inadvertently left my money at home and I had but 27 cents for carfare. I had to have a transfer as I was going downtown and had intended to use the Douglas Park "L". I was most embarrassed and explained the situation to the operator who was most courteous and loaned me the additional three cents.

"My father, who retired from CTA in 1951 after 40 years as a conductor, was very impressed with my praise for the operator, and I might add if he is any indication of the quality of men presently serving the public, Chicago can be justly proud of their metropolitan transit system."

A passenger whose signal for a stop was ignored resulting in him being carried past the street where he wished to alight brought this letter of complaint:

"This evening, the operator of a southbound Halsted bus ignored my signal to stop at 53rd street and took me to the next stop before I was able to get off. This is not the first time this has happened to me. The same thing occurred on an eastbound Garfield bus about a month ago. I don't like to complain, but because of this condition of my feet and legs I just can't walk too far. It would seem that your operators should be more alert and considerate when a passenger signals for a stop."

COMMENT: It is regretful that the rider was inconvenienced by failure of the operator to stop on signal. When these occurrences are reported and the offending operator identified prompt and effective action is taken to discourage similar conduct in the future.

Suggestions Pay Off for Electrical Worker

A HAPPY winner of a \$50.00 supplementary suggestion award is Nick Simonetti, electrical worker "A", South Shops, pictured here as he receives a check from T.B. A PREVIOUS winner of five suggestion cash awards recently came up with a sixth when he received a supplementary award of \$50.00 for an idea which was submitted and adopted last year.

Nick Simonetti, electrical worker "A", South Shops also was awarded \$50.00 at the time the original suggestion was accepted. The supplementary award was based on savings realized during the test period of a year as a result of his original idea.

Simonetti suggested that considerable man hours could be saved by altering a job procedure in the testing of large generators. He proposed changing the base assembly of a new electrical testing machine and adapting a base assembly from an old machine which was in storage as a replacement. The idea was tried and proved practical and resulted in a reduction of time formerly required for this operation from 45 to 10 minutes. Also a definite accident hazard was minimized by adoption of the suggestion. His suggestion awards now total \$135.00.

During the months of May and June, 18 other employes received cash awards in various amounts

for suggestions approved for further consideration. Those who received the awards were: John Gritis, reproduction services; Emmet Nolan, Paul Venticinque, Gunno Lindstedt of Skokie Shops; Martha Jugin, South Shops; Lenore De Sutter, Specifications, and Regina Daren, Medical, of the General Offices; Stanley Holmes, Transportation, Forest Glen; Linda Koehler, Law Department; Catherine Daly, and Rita Heinze, ticket agents, rapid transit system; Dwight Turner, C and M, 61st and Calumet; Martin Swanson and William Larson, S and E Department; Charles Kucera, surface transportation, Lawndale; Donald Burton, Claim; Sue Barthel, Employe Relations, and Herman Anders, Staff Engineer, of General Offices.

The Employes Suggestion Plan Committee reported that the results of the mailing campaign were very gratifying, with all departments going "over the top" in the number of suggestions submitted as compared to the previous month of May. Among the leaders were the surface division of the Transportation Department with an increase of 178 per cent; the rapid transit division, 288 per cent; Shops and Equipment Department, 233 per cent; and the General Offices, 320 per cent.

Courtesy Club Membership Tops 1,200 Mark

THE COURTESY Caravan Club continues to grow as CTA riders register their approval of good job performance by employes.

This is evident by the steady flow of commendations received by management which has reached a total of 2,133 since the start of the campaign in September, 1963. With 92 new members being favorably cited during the month of June, enrollment in the Club has grown to 1,256 employes.

A breakdown of surface stations shows North Park in the lead in the number of employes commended with 213, a score of 29.7 per cent of the personnel at that station. Percentage-wise, scores for the other stations, in the order of standings, are: 52nd, 28.5; Keeler, 28.2; Limits, 28.1; Forest Glen, 19.8; Kedzie, 18.8; 69th and 77th, 15.3; Lawndale, 14.7; North Avenue; 13.8; Beverly, 12.5, and Archer, 10.5.

The rapid transit system statistics are: North Section, 8.7; South Section, 5.2, West Section, 4.8, and ticket agents, 4.6.

Top man in the number of commendations received is Kelly Gilio, badge 11648, Kedzie, with 62. In second place is Cleven Wardlow, badge 1972, Limits, with 41.

MEDICALLY SPEAKING

HAY FEVER AND ASTHMA

WE ARE fast approaching the time of the year when hayfever and asthma will be affecting several million people in this country. These illnesses are classified as allergy diseases. This subject was discussed in the Transit News a few years ago. However, because so many people are afflicted with this disorder, it is considered important enough to write again briefly on hayfever and asthma. These patients are really interested in their illness because it causes much suffering and discomfort. Also it frequently causes a financial loss to the patient and employer. Hayfever and asthma will be discussed together because they are closely related to one another. As a matter of fact the same allergin may cause both hayfever and asthma.

The name hayfever is a misnomer because as a rule, the disorder is not associated with fever or contact with hay. An English doctor coined the name because so many people happened to be bothered around "hay time". Actually most all of the cases occur in mid-summer and early fall. It occurs in both the male and female. In the U.S. it is most prevelant in the eastern and midwest states.

The development of allergic disorders usually occurs in the following manner. The susceptible person has some skin sensitizing antibody in his tissues and the antigen such as ragweed pollen to which he is allergic reacts with the antibody. When the antibody and antigen combine several substances are liberated, one of which, is histamine. Histamine really causes most of the allergic symptoms. Among the common pollen mischief makers are early spring and summer grasses, birch, poplar, cottonwood, hickory, walnut, ash, mulberry, sycamore and most troublesome of all, the ragweed family. Certain people also may be allergic to other substances, such as various foods, cosmetics, drugs, tobacco, dusts and certain vaccines.

The sumptoms of hayfever consist of red eyes, stuffy nose, sneezing, a nasal discharge and coughing. Fever is only noted in cases which are complicated by infection. The symptoms also include bronchial wheezing, persistent cough and extreme difficulty in getting ones breath.

The above picture of asthma is seen mostly in the extrinsic type of asthma which is due to some external allergin. In the intrinsic type the cause usually originates from inside of the body. The cause may come from chemical, metabolic, toxic or infectious changes. This type is difficult to diagnose accurately and also difficult to treat. In general the symptoms of hayfever come mostly from the head and in asthma, symptoms are associated with bronchial changes in the chest.

The diagnosis of hayfever and asthma is usually made by the presence of the indicated symptoms and also may be confirmed by skin tests, and blood examinations. In a few puzzling cases the diagnosis requires more detailed examinations and observation of reactions.

Treatment is directed toward immunization against the pollen, or whatever the offender may be, by use of antihistamine drugs or going to a different climate.

The experts have outlined the treatment in four categories:

(1) Hide or go away from the pollens which are causing the trouble. (2) Reduce their spread. (3) Immunization by infection. (4) Take medicines to minimize your discomfort.

In the first category, it is very helpful if patients can go to the mountains or on an ocean cruise, where the pollens do not exist. For many working people, however, this is not possible.

The second choice may be helpful to people who cannot go away. Reduce the spread of pollens and dust in the house by removing draperies, carpets and similar dust-catching items. Air conditioning in the home is also beneficial.


The third choice is immunization by injections which gradually build up resistance to the pollens.

The fourth choice is mainly for mild cases. Many people get relief from antihistamine drugs and nasal sprays.

A visit to your doctor is usually necessary to determine which type of treatment is best for you.




