Engineering Consultant M. B. Knox Dies at 73

AFTER A short illness, Merrill B. Knox died in Presbyterian-St. Luke's hospital on June 7. Mr. Knox' career in transit extended over 50 years.

As a mechanical engineering graduate of Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Mr. Knox came to the Chicago Rapid Transit in 1920 for his early training. Later, as a transit consultant, he headed the firm of Merrill B. Knox and Associates with accounts of National City Lines and other transit companies throughout the country. He also served as hearing officer for the Illinois Commerce Commission and worked closely with the Department of Subways and Superhighways of the City of Chicago in the construction of the State and Dearborn street subways. From 1945 to 1962 he was the engineer for the village of River Forest. He joined CTA in 1952 and retired in 1961; remaining as a consultant until the time of his death.

He is survived by a son, John, and two grandchildren.

Four CTA Retirees Honored

FOUR MEN whose lengthy careers in the transit industry started in 1933-34 were among those who retired on June 1. They are Robert E. Baxter, Charles E. Lapp, Valentine J. Nessinger, and George J. Wickman.

All four are pictured here at the time of their retirements receiving congratulations and best wishes from their supervisors and fellow employes. In the top picture, Mr. Baxter (left) and his wife are shown with Manager of Finance P. J. Meinardi and Budget Accountant W. J. Parrillo. Mr. Baxter, who retired as budget accountant in the Accounting Department, started with the former Chicago Rapid Transit as a Schedule Department traffic checker in October, 1933. He became a time checker in that department in 1942 and in May, 1951, he transferred to the Accounting Department as a time audit clerk. Mr. Baxter subsequently served as budget clerk, supervising budget clerk, accountant, and assistant budget supervisor until his appointment as budget accountant in February, 1966, the post he held until his retirement.

Even before Mr. Lapp started with the CSL in January, 1934, he had served as a bus driver for Chicago Motor Coach during the summers of 1929 and 1930 and as a trainman on West Towns streetcars from 1932 to 1934. In the Transportation Department he served as a streetcar motorman until becoming a starter and junior supervisor in 1936. Mr. Lapp became an instructor in 1942 and transferred to the Staff Engineers Office in May, 1944, to become the supervising transfer analyst. He served as transit analyst from January, 1951, to September, 1966, when he became senior transit analyst in the Staff Engineers Office, which was reorganized as the Research & Planning Department in 1967.

Starting in July, 1934, as acting assistant cashier in the Chicago Surface Lines' Claim Department, Mr. Nessinger became assistant cashier in 1937 and workmen's compensation clerk in 1942. After transferring to the Law Department as a court assistant in February, 1950, Mr. Nessinger subsequently became law clerk III and finally law clerk V, the post he held from September, 1962, until his retirement.



Spending his entire transit career in the Transportation Department, Mr. Wickman joined the CSL as a motorman in March, 1934. He subsequently served as a junior supervisor starting in 1943, as an instructor starting in 1946, and was assigned to the surface training school at Limits Station in 1949, where he remained until the time of his retirement.

Award Winners Receive \$995.00 for Accepted Ideas

IN ITS report for the first four months of 1970, the Employe Suggestion Plan announced the adoption of 40 suggestions and the presentation of cash awards of \$995 to CTA employes.

The Suggestion Plan also authorized an additional award to be given to the first 48 employes whose suggestions are adopted between May 1 and July 31. The bonus awards are baseballs personally signed by each member of one of Chicago's two major league baseball teams—the first 24 baseballs to be issued are signed by the White Sox and the second 24 by the Cubs. This award is in addition to the \$7.00 gift certificate or lighter/tape rule set presented to each employe whose suggestion is adopted and cash awards of up to \$10,000, based on actual savings to the Authority resulting from the suggestion.


For their ideas adopted in the January-April period, eight CTA'ers were presented cash awards of from \$25 to \$150. Receiving checks to the amount of \$150 were two employes—Jerome Pavel, Shops & Equipment-South Shops, and Roger Torbik, General Office-Employe Relations. Winning an \$80 award was Harold Johnson, Shops & Equipment-77th Street. Four other S&E Department employes, all of South Shops, were also named as cash winners: \$65-Richard Naecker, \$65-Stanley Romanosky, \$45-Eugene Page, and with two separate \$25 awards-Max R. Kuchan. A General Office employe who earned a \$25 suggestion award was Darlene Verheeck, Purchasing.

For submitting their second adoptable suggestion within a year, four employes became eligible to receive \$25 cash awards, including: Edward Federo-

wicz, Transportation-Limits Station; James Nagel, Engineering-West Shops; Melvin Scheiner, General Office-Mail Room, and William Novotny, S&E-South Shops.

Cashing in on ideas they submitted a year ago, and which continued to produce savings to CTA, were four CTA'ers who became entitled to supplemental awards. E. F. Weingartner, Claim Dept. Head, Dies at 59

MASS FOR Edward F. Weingartner, 59, general superintendent of investigations and claims for CTA, who died suddenly on April 28, was said May 2 at St. John Nepomucene church, 2953 S. Lowe avenue.

Mr. Weingartner joined the former Chicago Surface Lines in 1933 and spent his entire career in the Investigations and Claims Department of the CSL and CTA. He was named assistant superintendent of that department in 1964 and general superintendent in 1968.

Mr. Weingartner was past chairman of the Claims Committee of the American Transit Association, of which CTA is a member.

Survivors include his widow, Lillian; two sons, Edward and Donald; a daughter, Mrs. Judith Dabrowski, and four grandchildren.

MEDICALLY SPEAKING

GOUT IS a type of arthritis which is due to abnormal use by our body of uric acid. In fact, gout is the only type of arthritis which is linked to body metabolism. Metabolism is the basic process by which our body converts food into growth and energy and then passes off the unused portion as waste products. The key to gout is probably the faulty excretion or passing off of uric acid.

Gout is perhaps the oldest medically recognized disease—this condition was described by Hippocrates at about 400 B.C. In the beginning it was commonly considered an ailment of the kings and queens. However, medical science has since shown that gout is not entirely due to the high living which is associated with too much rich foods, wine, and beer. Statistics show that it occurs almost as often in the poor house as in the mansion. At first it was thought to be almost entirely a man's disease. Now it is known to frequently affect women.

In gout, uric acid, which is developed in the body from many foods, is deposited in joints and tendons, and as a rule causes great pain. This is not always true, however. Different persons react differently to excesses of uric acid. One person will suffer from gout while another will not, even when they both have the same level of uric acid in the blood.

The explanation is faulty metabolism in the gouty patient. In other words, this patient does not excrete or pass off the excess uric acid. The real underlying reason for the body's inability to pass off or excrete the excess of uric acid is most likely due to a deficiency in the adrenal glands. When these glands work properly they secrete an adrenal hormone which keeps blood uric acid in proper balance.

Common precipitating factors in the development of gout are injuries or chronic irritation, such as illfitting shoes or gloves, surgical operations on joints,

infection, allergic reactions, exposure to excessive cold or heat, and finally, psychic upsets which result in a deficiency in the secretion in the adrenal glands.

The symptoms and signs of gout are usually manifested in the following way: gout most frequently hits the bunion joint of the big toe. The toe becomes red, hot, swollen, and very painful—this is often noted in the middle of the night. However, but not so common, any joint can be involved such as ankles, fingers, elbows, or knees. It can even affect the eyes, ears, or tendons of the hands and feet. Gout is apt to run in families and is most common at ages of 40 to 60 years. It can occur earlier in life, but this is rare. It is a chronic, but not a constant disease, returning and going away from time to time. The attacks usually last from two to four weeks. Kidney stones are a frequent complication of gout.

The diagnosis is usually easily made from the above clinical picture. In addition, the increase in the blood uric acid and X-rays as a rule clinch the diagnosis of gout.

TREATMENT OF GOUT: Although diet is involved in treatment, changes in the diet cannot alone effect a cure. Certain foods such as liver, sweetbreads, brains, kidney, and tripe should be eliminated. Wines and beer are more likely to be a factor than hard liquors.

Practically, treatment may be divided into two parts: management of the acute attacks, and application of preventative measures between attacks.

The acute attack: protection of the involved joint by a cradle, splints, sling or crutches, and pain relieving drugs such as colchicine, butazolidin, colbenamide, and the cortisone group. Some are given by mouth and others by injection.

The preventative management has two objectives, to prevent recurrent attacks and to prevent progressive joint changes. Use of the drugs mentioned above in proper doses may be taken for months or years without toxic effects. Also avoiding excessive cold or heat, infections, chronic joint pressures, and improper diets will help to reduce the possibility of future attacks.

As I have pointed out in all previous articles, the most important advice I can give you is to see your family doctor early if gout is suspected.
