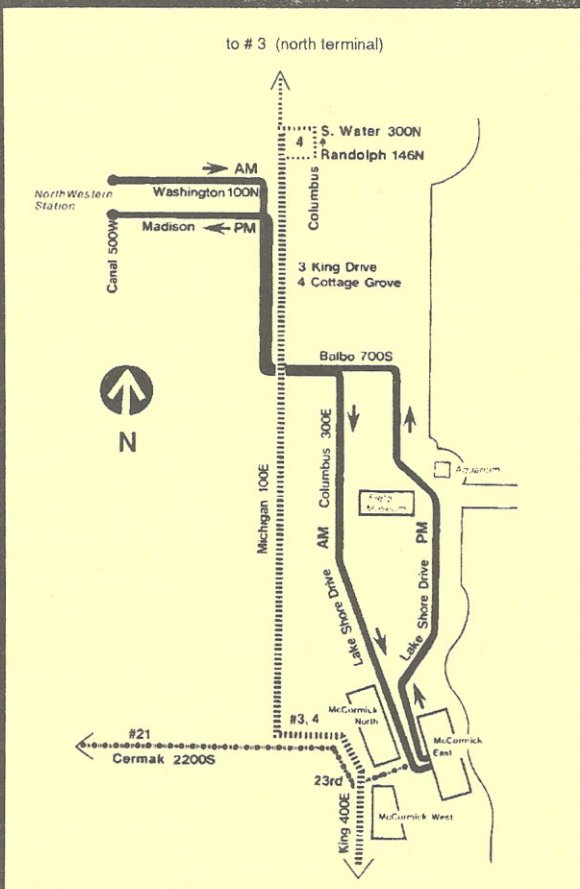

Getting to McCormick Place is quick and easy by CTA

From O'HARE Airport :

Take CTA trains located at Terminal #4 lower level to Washington station. Transfer coupons are available for a nominal charge and should be purchased when paying fare. At Washington station, exit using the Randolph-Washington stairs. On Washington Street, transfer to the #127 direct service line to McCormick Place. Non rush hour service is available three blocks east on Michigan Avenue via the #3 or #4 bus to 23rd Street and McCormick Place West.

From North Michigan Avenue:

From stops south of Chicago Avenue take the #3 bus to 23rd Street and McCormick Place West.

From Most Northside and Westside Locations:

Take any CTA bus or train to Washington Street, and transfer to the #127. During off peak hours take the #3 or #4 bus from Michigan Avenue to 23rd Street and McCormick Place West.

From Most Southside and Southwest Side Locations:

Take the CTA Dan Ryan train to the Cermak/Chinatown station. Once there, transfer to the #21 Cermak bus direct to McCormick Place East. Additional service is available via the #62 Archer bus (local or express) to Archer and Cermak, then transferring to the #21 Cermak bus to McCormick Place.

From the Southeast:

Take the northbound #3 King Drive from 95th, or the #4 Cottage Grove from 94th Street, to 23rd Street and McCormick Place West.

How to Use the CTA

CTA provides bus and rapid transit train service to all of Chicago and 39 suburbs. Most service is frequent, with buses operating every 10 to 20 minutes all day and evening. Some routes operate 24 hours. Transfers allow you to use up to two additional vehicles (either CTA buses or trains, or suburban system buses) for a one way trip. Buses stop about every two blocks, at posted signs that have specific route information. Exact fare is required on buses, but not on rail stations. The "L"/subway system is easy to use, fast, and well marked. Overhead platform signs indicate direction.

Sunday schedules are also operated on New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas. For city and suburban transit information, call the Travel Information Center at 312 - 836-7000 (from suburbs, toll free 1-800-972-7000). **Tell agent the day and time of your trip.**

Routing:

The # 127 begins its route at NorthWestern Station, eastbound on Washington. After crossing the river, the #127 heads east to Michigan, then to Balbo. Once on Balbo, it continues south on Columbus Drive and Lake Shore Drive, direct to McCormick Place East, heads north on Lake Shore Drive and turns west on Balbo. Turning north once again from Balbo onto Michigan Avenue, the #127 heads west on Madison ending service at Canal for NorthWestern Station. Board at posted signs (about every other block in the downtown area). See map.

Special Service:

Extra #127 Service is operated on weekdays and weekends for:

..Auto Show. Service starts about an hour before opening and continues until doors close, with buses leaving every 10 minutes.
