

Chicago Water Tower ■ "Here's Chicago" ★ **Water Tower Place** John Hancock Center *

North Michigan Avenue's most popular shopping center is named after the Chicago Water Tower, symbol of the city's survival and reconstruction after the Great Fire of 1871. The pumping station across the street is the home of the Visitor Information Center and of "Here's Chicago," a film and slide show spectacular about the city. Open Sundays and holidays: 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Standard admission for 'Here's Chicago': \$4.75 adults; \$3.50 seniors and students; \$2.50 children (12 and under). Water Tower Place is open Sundays and holidays, noon to 5 p.m. At nearby John Hancock Center, visitors to the 94th floor observatory can get a breathtaking view of Chicago's lake shore. 

Holy Trinity Orthodox Cathedral



Garfield Park Conservatory

Mexican Fine Arts Center Museum

Jackson Boulevard Historic District

Some prominent Chicago families once lived in these century-old Victorian homes. Restored in recent years, the entire block is now a landmark. (For tour information, call 782-1776.) Jackson Blvd/Laflin; 11:53—5:23

Greektown

Chicago's best Greek restaurants, bakeries and shops moved north on Halsted between Adams and Van Buren Streets when the original Greek community was displaced by the Chicago campus of the University of Illinois just to the south. Most of these establishments are open on Sundays to welcome Culture Bus riders. Halsted/Van Buren: 11:57—5:27

Jane Addams Hull-House

Established by Jane Addams in 1889, Hull-House was a settlement house offering programs of education, social welfare and neighborhood activities, particularly for immigrant families. Maxwell Street Market

Chinatown

Museum of Broadcast Communications

Steve Allen, Milton Berle and other veteran stars have appeared at this museum to share nostalgic moments in radio and television broadcasting history that are preserved on tapes available for playing by visitors. Spertus Museum of Judaica

Presents changing exhibits and a collection of ceremonial objects of gold, silver, bronze and ivory; sculpture, paintings, textiles, scrolls and other artifacts, relating to Jewish culture. Culture Bus Fares

The Culture Bus Supertransfer allows unlimited riding on all Culture Buses, CTA buses/trains, and suburban buses all day and evening. Exact fare required; dollar bills are accepted.

The cash fare is \$2.50 for adults and \$1.25 for seniors (65 and older with proof of age), children (7 thru 11), disabled (with Special Users Travel Card). Children, 6 or under, free with adult.

With a Supertransfer, adults pay 75 cents, and seniors/children/disabled pay 40 cents. Operator will punch your Supertransfer for Culture Bus use.

With a standard transfer or Monthly Pass, adults pay \$1.25, and seniors/children/disabled pay 60 cents; obtain Culture Bus Supertransfer from operator.

Double-Decker Bus Fares

Adults: \$5.00; senior citizens \$4.00; children under 12 \$2.00.

Half-Fare Transfer Regulations

By showing a CTA Culture Bus Supertransfer to Chicago Motor Coach Company bus operators, adults pay \$2.50, senior citizens \$2.00, and children under 12 \$1.00 to ride CMC Double-decker buses.

By showing a Chicago Motor Coach Company ticket to CTA Culture Bus operators, adults pay \$1.25, and senior citizens and children 60 cents to ride CTA Culture Buses.

Half-fare rate on CTA Culture Buses valid only on date shown on Chicago Motor Coach Company ticket. Transfer from Culture Buses to Double-Deckers valid for half-fare rate through Friday of the following week, but only on CMC Double-Deckers.
