## "105 Years of the 'L'" with Bruce G. Moffat

A 60-90 minute slide presentation showing the origins and development of Chicago's rapid transit system. Starting with steam locomotives in the 1890s and concluding with today's modern trains, this presentation will take you through the complete history and background of our bus and rail system.

Mr. Moffat is a lifelong Chicago resident with an avid interest in transportation history and operations. His interest in the 'L' dates back to childhood days on the city's west side. Mr. Moffat has worked in various operations, planning and capital grant administration capacities with the Chicago Transit Authority, Continental Air Transport and the Regional Transportation Authority. He is currently the Administration Manager for the CTA Brown Line and author of "The 'L' – The Development of Chicago's Rapid Transit System, 1888–1932".

## "Transit Advertising During the 1920s" with David Gartler

Between 1923 and 1927, a remarkable series of posters were created to publicize the rail companies owned by the utilities magnet, Charles Insull. These companies included the Chicago Rapid Transit Company, which later became the CTA, as well as the North Shore, South Shore, and Chicago, Aurora and Elgin Lines. The importance of the posters in promoting ridership on these lines, as well as their

popularity and artistic merit will be the subject of this slide presentation.

Mr. Gartler is the founder and owner of Poster Plus at 200 S. Michigan Avenue, a gallery devoted to contemporary and vintage original posters and poster related products. In 1975, Poster Plus held an exhibition of Chicago rail posters with over 60 originals on display. In 1981, Poster Plus began a program of reproducing Chicago rail posters. Mr. Gartler is a founding member of the International Poster Dealers Association, and is currently writing a book on Chicago rail posters.

### The Fugitive
